the President's assent before it becomes law. The President may also return an ordinary Bill for reconsideration, thereby encouraging legislative scrutiny and constitutional compliance. Under Article 123, when Parliament is not in session and immediate legislative action is necessary, the President has the authority to promulgate Ordinances, which have the same force as an Act of Parliament until approved by Parliament.

The President also exercises important financial powers. No Money Bill can be introduced in the Lok Sabha without the President's prior recommendation. The Annual Financial Statement, commonly known as the Union Budget, is presented to Parliament in the President's name. The President recommends demands for grants and authorizes advances from the Contingency Fund of India whenever required. These constitutional responsibilities ensure that public expenditure and financial administration remain subject to constitutional procedures and parliamentary control.

The judicial powers of the President are equally significant. Under Article 72, the President has the authority to grant pardons, reprieves, respites, remissions, or commutations of punishment in specified cases, including death sentences, court-martial convictions, and offences relating to Union laws. This power acts as an important constitutional safeguard against judicial errors and allows humanitarian considerations to be taken into account while respecting the independence of the judiciary.

As the Supreme Commander of the Armed Forces, the President performs important constitutional and ceremonial functions relating to national defence. The President appoints the Chiefs of the Army, Navy, and Air Force and represents the authority of the Indian state in matters of national security.
